

## irate: extremely angry

## tirade: a long angry rant or speech

My boss went on a tirade yesterday after we lost our 7th client this month.

# pet peeve: a small thing that, for some reason, makes you really angry

Whenever my roommate doesn't clean his dishes I get so angry. It's my pet peeve.

# pissed off: extremely angry (this is a slightly offensive slang word)

I was watching soccer yesterday and my husband broke the tv. I was so pissed off.
